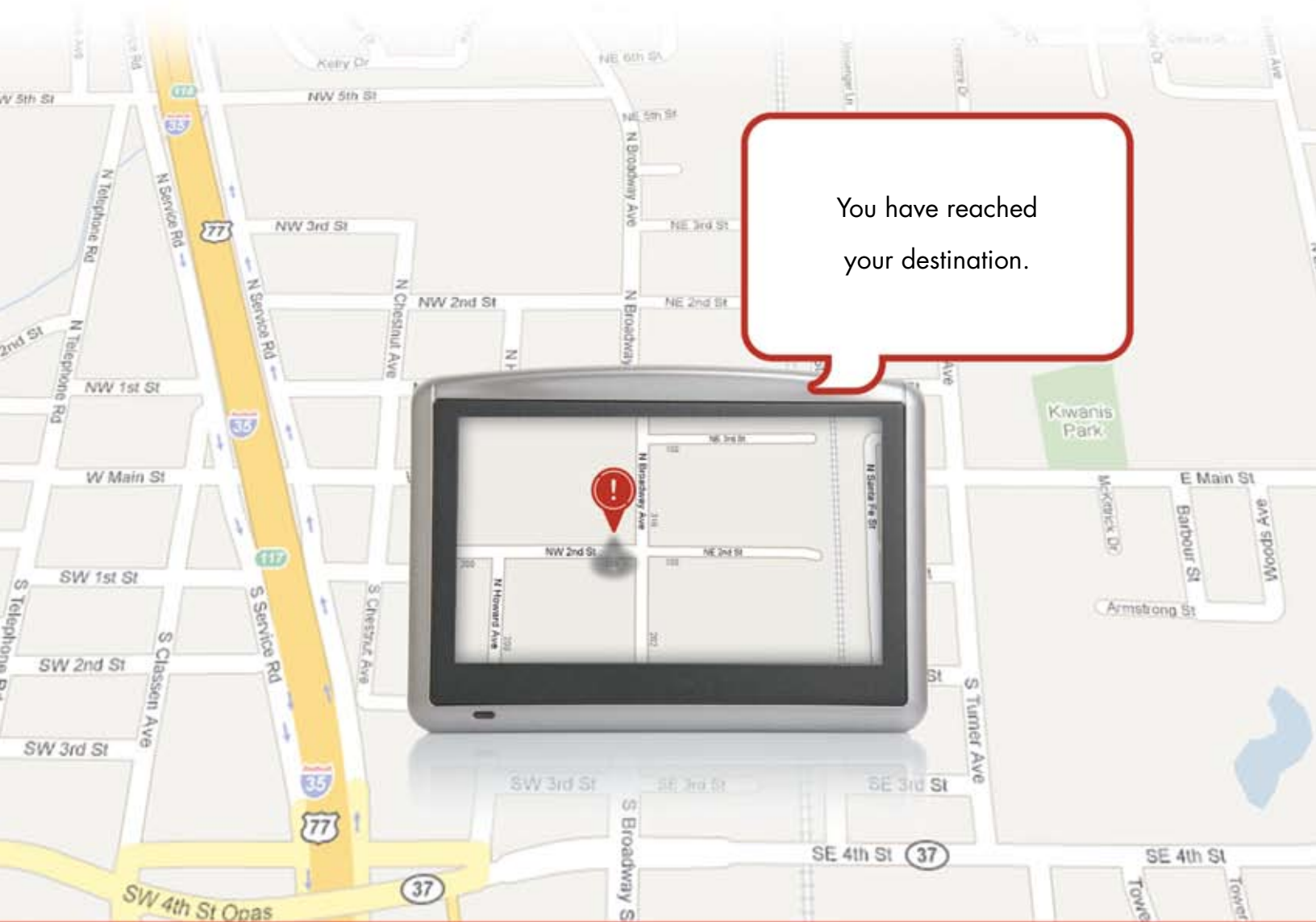



That is approximately 11,000 more people than we started this decade with. Our population growth rate far exceeds the growth of our state and our nation! In fact, we are one of the fastest growing communities in Oklahoma. Something we should be very proud of.

The Moore City Council and our Management Team spend a significant amount of time defining what makes Moore a "great community". We have aggressively reshaped the image of Moore both to our citizens and people outside of Moore over the last few years. We are seeing the fruits of our labor as we hear from more and more people about how proud they are to say that they come from Moore, work in Moore, or live in Moore. While we see a great amount of satisfaction in our work, the task is not done. A great amount of work is left to do.

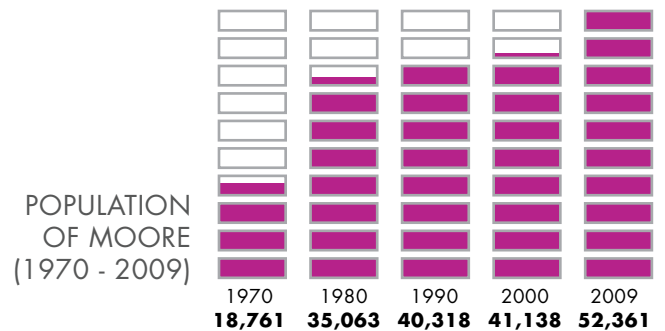
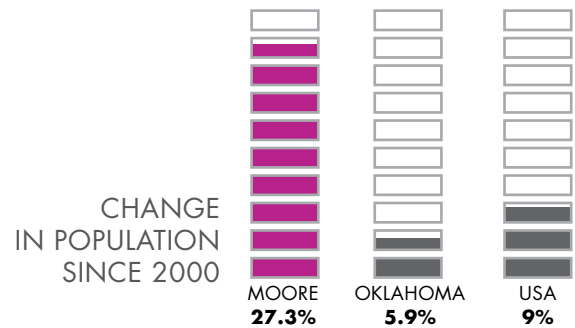




## POPULATION

Once again, Moore saw continued population growth that exceeded both state and national growth rates.

The leadership of the community recognizes the vital role growth plays in a community. We desire to see Moore grow because that growth creates jobs, opportunity for all of our citizens, and an economic vitality that makes Moore a better place to live, work, and raise a family. ### FACTS TO REMEMBER

- Moore's population has increased over 11,000 since the 2000 census.
- The 2008 estimated median age of people living in Moore is 34.
- The population for Moore in 2013 is estimated to be 56,776.
- In 2000, there were 14,888 households in Moore. By the 3rd quarter 2008, the household count was estimated to be 18,861.
- The annualized growth in population for Moore from 2000 to 2008 is 7.02%.
- The 2009 population in Moore is estimated to be 52,361.



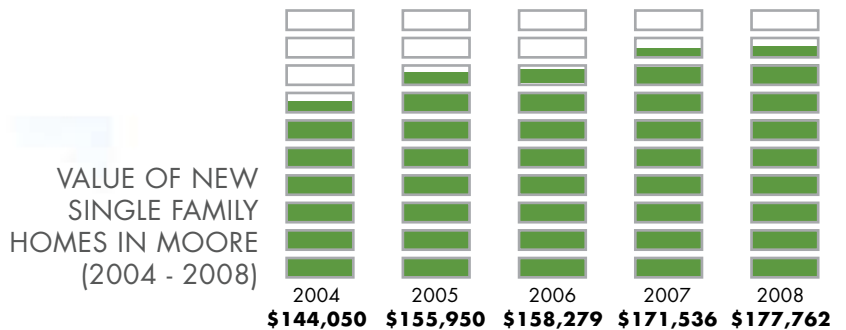
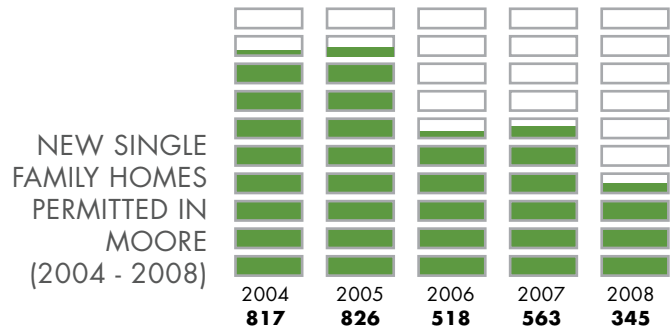


# HOUSING

The dominant economic story of 2008 was the continued nationwide housing and credit crisis.

We are fortunate in Moore in that we have not seen a real estate slump like that being experienced throughout much of the country. In 2008, Moore saw 345 single-family homes permitted. While housing starts slowed drastically in 2008, home values both new and existing are continuing to rise at a healthy rate. New home prices increased approximately 3.6% in 2008 compared to 2007. This is quite good considering the state of home values nationwide.

For most of us the largest investment we will make is in our home. With what we have to offer in Moore, our quality of life, safe neighborhoods and fantastic school system, the investment in your home is a wise one.



Whatever your style or whatever your price range may be, rest assured there is a home for you in Moore. We would love to have you choose Moore as your place to live, work, and raise your family!

## FACTS TO REMEMBER

- 4,586 new single-family homes have been built in Moore since 2000.
- The average selling price of a new home in Moore is approximately \$177,762.
- The average sale price in the Oklahoma City market was \$152,724.
- For 2008, new homes were selling 3.6% higher than in 2007.
- 70.3% of the homes in Moore have values of \$80,000 or more.
- The average sale price of all homes in Moore for 2008 was \$129,488 (new and preowned).
- The average size home sold in Moore in 2008 was 1557 square feet.





## QUALITY OF LIFE



Businesses look not only at affordable land and labor for relocations or expansions of their business, they also look at a community's quality of life.

In Moore, we have all three! Land and labor are quite affordable but we also boast of having an unsurpassed quality of life. From our excellent school system to our affordable shopping, festive dining and one-of-a-kind living, our quality of life is a key ingredient in any businesses' relocation or expansion plans.

City Hall takes great pride in delivering first-rate local services. Combine this with our community leadership, vibrant business climate, first-class school system, safe neighborhoods and an array of recreation and leisure activities and you get a quality lifestyle unlike any other in the metro area.

### PARKS AND RECREATION

One of the largest parks to visit in the metro-area is Moore's very own Buck Thomas Park. Buck Thomas Park has the most amenities of any park in the Moore park system. This park has facilities for football, baseball, softball, tennis, beautiful walking trails, and a skate park. Buck Thomas Park is the location for the annual Art in the Park: A Celebration in the Heartland July 4th celebration.

Two other parks to visit include the Veterans Memorial Park at SE 4th and Bryant and the Little River Park just west of Telephone Road on 4th Street. Veterans Memorial Park has

a dedicated Veterans Memorial which opened in August 2007. The park has undergone major improvements including a new playground, the addition of a new parking lot, and a walking trail. Little River Park has also undergone extensive improvements. Two large ponds have been added as well as new landscaping and a new playground. Wherever your location in Moore, you have easy access to these parks as well as the other 6 neighborhood parks throughout Moore!

The Moore Parks and Recreation Department also operates the Brand Senior Citizen Center and the Moore Community Center. The City of Moore sponsors several leagues, camps, and educational and recreational classes with such diverse offerings as arts and crafts, childhood enrichment, dance, and self-defense classes.

### ART IN THE PARK: A CELEBRATION IN THE HEARTLAND

Art in the Park: A Celebration in the Heartland is an annual outdoor festival that attracts spectators from Moore, the surrounding communities, and across the state. This event, held at Buck Thomas Park in Moore features a variety of arts and crafts, entertainment, and food. In 2008, a carnival was added which was greatly received by event attendees. The festival features a city-sponsored fireworks display in the evening. The average attendance for the July 4th event is over 30,000.

### FACTS TO REMEMBER

- Art in the Park: A Celebration in the Heartland draws in excess of 30,000 spectators each year.
- The KidsPlay Moore Playground was built in 2000 and has over 11,000 square feet of play space.
- Belmar Golf Club: An 18-hole championship private country club. Amenities include, clubhouse, bar and grill, pro shop, banquet room, and outdoor swimming pool. Course length is 6,635 yards.
- Moore Golf and Athletic Club: 18-hole championship golf course. Amenities include, state of the art fitness center, clubhouse, and meeting rooms. Course length is 6,789 yards.
- Broadmoore Golf Course: The oldest course in Moore is a challenging par 71 course with a yardage of 6,334.
- In 2008 voters approved an \$18 million dollar bond issue program. The bond program will fund five major street projects. The first of the five projects is slated to start in early 2009.
- In November 2006, voters approved a temporary (the tax will expire in March 2011), 4-year ½ cent sales tax to fund one-time capital items for our fire, police, and emergency management departments. The first of three fire stations is scheduled to be under construction in early 2009.

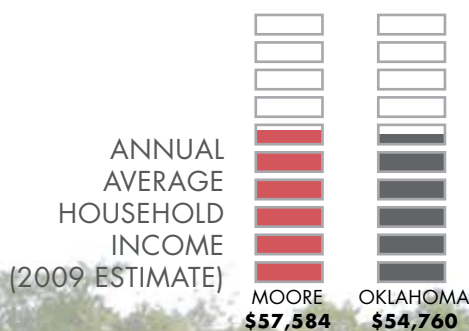
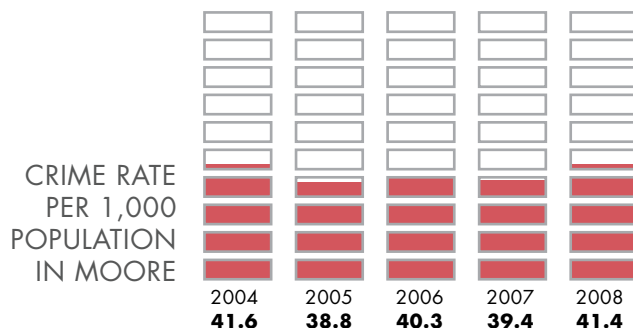




# LIFESTYLE

## BUSINESS CLIMATE

*\*\*The voters of Moore approved a temporary 1/2 cent increase in the local sales tax to fund one-time capital items to the Moore Police, Fire, and Emergency Management departments. The tax went into effect April 1, 2007 and will expire March 30, 2011.*

### UTILITIES

Moore is served by two electric utilities, OG&E and Oklahoma Electric Cooperative. Oklahoma Natural Gas provides natural gas service. Phone service is provided by AT&T and Cox Communications. Numerous cell phone companies provide service to Moore.

### RIGHT TO WORK

In 2001, Oklahomans approved a constitutional amendment giving individuals the right-to-work regardless of paid membership or financial support of a labor union or organization. The Oklahoma Legislature sent this measure to the voters. This law now allows workers to seek or keep employment regardless of union membership requirements.

### PRODUCTIVE AND SKILLED WORKFORCE

Absenteeism, work stoppages and turnover levels are well below national averages.

### TRANSPORTATION

Companies can easily serve one of the fastest-growing consumer market areas from Moore's central location. Moore offers same-day or overnight transport access to half of the United States population, with next-day capability to the entire nation. Interstate highways connect Oklahoma within a days drive to all U.S. markets.

### HEALTH CARE

Moore Medical Center joined the award-winning Norman Regional Health System family in 2007, and has since become a key component to providing vital healthcare for the community it serves.

The Moore community relies on Moore Medical Center for general medical and surgical needs, occupational therapy, speech therapy, physical therapy, cardiopulmonary services, obstetrical services, 24-hour emergency services and close-to-home diagnostic imaging. Moore Medical Center has attracted experts to the area and added 10 new physicians since joining NRHS.

Committed to its community, Moore Medical Center is also finding ways to reach out and give back. During the city's annual Bike to Work Day, Moore Medical Center was a destination point and served up a healthy breakfast to participants. Moore Medical Center is involved in community events including the support of the Moore Chamber of Commerce, American Red Cross, Moore Public Schools Foundation, sponsored a "Drive Thru Flu Clinic" and gave over 500 free flu shots to the community, and Southmoore High School's team sports athletic training program.

Moore Medical Center is committed to providing the highest quality and personalized care for the community it serves.

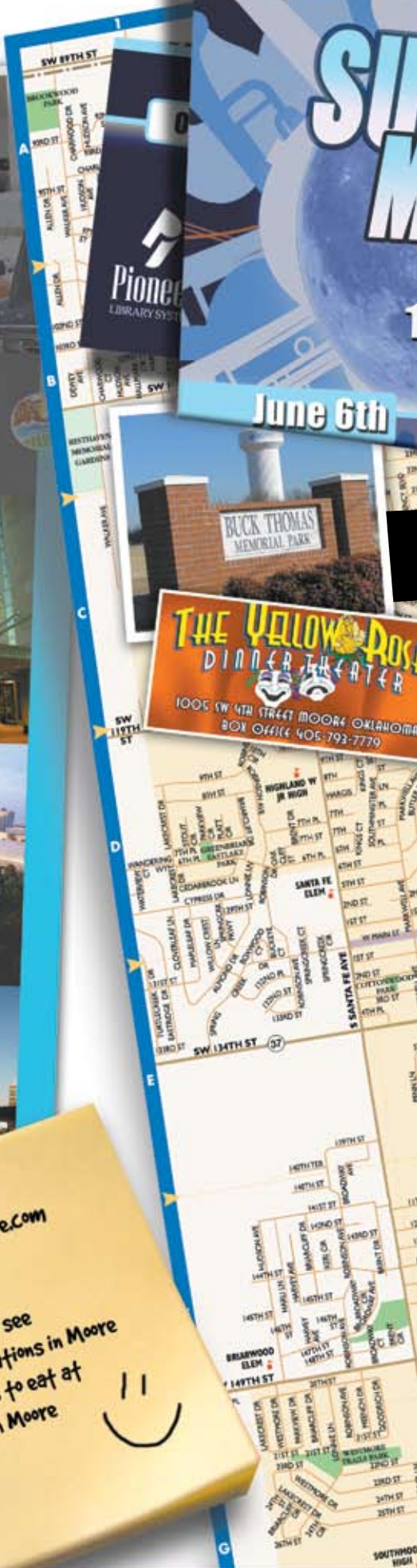

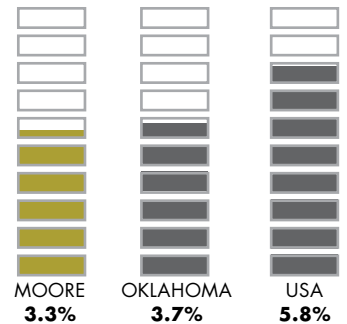

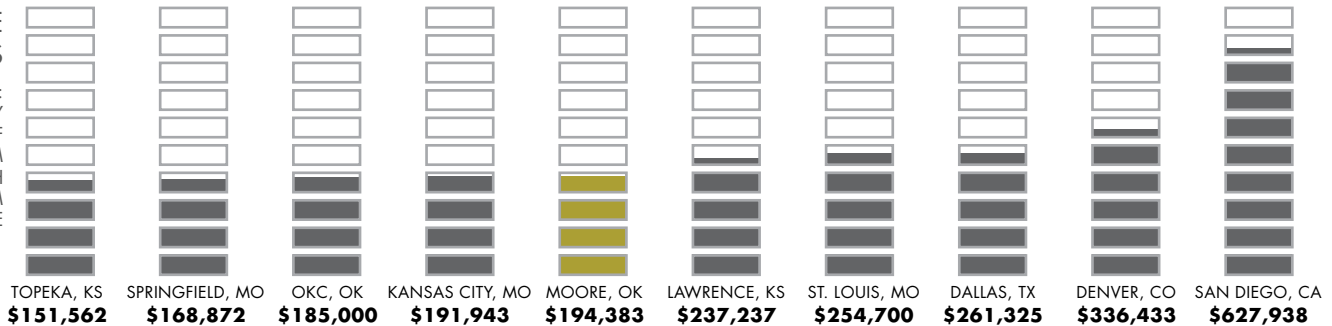

### FACTS TO REMEMBER

- The 2008 unemployment rate for Moore averaged 3.3%. This is one of the lowest unemployment rates in Oklahoma. The State average unemployment rate was 3.7%.
- The average unemployment rate for Jan through Dec 2008 for the USA was 5.8%.
- The 2008 estimated household average income was \$56,598.
- Moore's per capita income growth since 2000 has been 16%. The national per capita growth for the same period was 12.6%.





## BUSINESS GROWTH



### Critical to the Moore economy is the retail trade and restaurant industries.

The retail trade in Moore includes not only big box stores but such diverse businesses as gas stations, supermarkets, restaurants, small niche retailers, and small gift shops. Retail sales provide the City of Moore the ability to fund street construction projects, police and fire protection, drainage and right-of-way maintenance, and park improvements. Moore continues to be a draw for national, regional, and local retail stores. Our retail growth outpaces most cities our size, making us a haven for retail of all types and sizes.

### COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL

In 2008, the Hyatt Corporation opened their 45,000 sq. ft Shared Services Center in Moore. A nationwide search led site locators to Moore based on availability of a skilled workforce and a business-friendly climate. The center is expected to employ 200+ people who manage customer care and financial services for all of Hyatt's North American hotels.

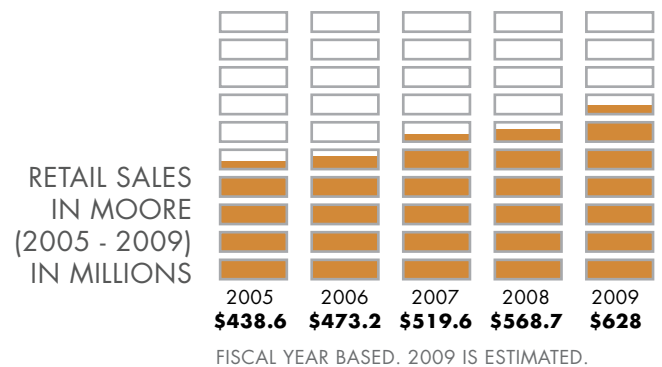
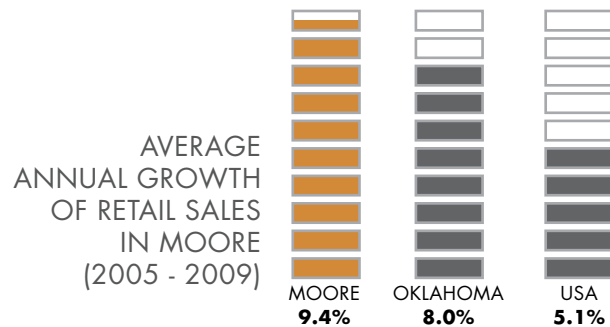
In early 2009, a land service company, 1st American Professional Land Services will bring approximately 50 new jobs to Moore. This company provides land service, surveying, and title work services to its customers.

### OLD TOWN

Staying true to the original business district in Moore, city staff has devoted time and energy to assist a well-organized merchant association in the Old Town area. Efforts have paid off as Old Town has hosted several well-attended events and, more importantly, added eight new businesses to the area.

### 2009 PREVIEW

For next year, more commercial growth is expected with national companies such as Bed Bath & Beyond, PetSmart, and Marriott SpringHill Suites opening in the early part of 2009. More announcements are on the brink as companies see Moore as a risk worth taking during strained economic times. Local, boutique-type retailers and eateries will find their niche in Moore and help to round out Moore's shopping and dining experience.



## FACTS TO REMEMBER

- FY 2007/2008 sales tax collections were 9.5% above the previous fiscal year.
- Year to date sales tax (Jul-Dec) for Fiscal Year 08/09 is 14% above 07/08.
- Over \$600 million dollars will be distributed through the Moore economy in retail sales in 2009.
- Per person retail expenditures in Moore have increased 28.1% since 2005. This means more dollars are being spent in Moore businesses.
- For 2008, new commercial construction was 76% higher than in 2007. Total commercial construction was \$46,000,000 in 2008. Most of that was spent along the I-35 corridor from 4th to south of 19th Street.

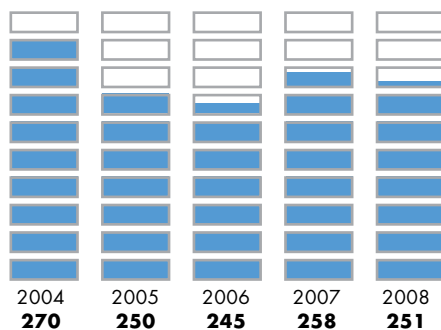
### HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE
