Storm Drains vs. Sanitary Sewers





It's easy to confuse storm drains with the sanitary sewer system, but they serve very different purposes and are not connected. Sanitary sewers carry wastewater from inside your home—such as sinks, showers, toilets, and washing machines—through a system of pipes that leads to a treatment plant. At the plant, this water is carefully cleaned, filtered, and treated before being released back into the environment, ensuring that it meets safety and health standards.

Storm drains, on the other hand, are part of the City's stormwater system and are designed only to carry rainwater runoff away from streets, yards, driveways, and parking lots to help prevent flooding. Unlike sanitary sewers, storm drains do not connect to a treatment plant. Whatever goes into them flows directly into nearby creeks, streams, and eventually Lake Thunderbird. This means pollutants such as oil from cars, paint, grass clippings, lawn chemicals, pet waste, soap, or trash that are dumped or washed into storm drains end up directly in our waterways without any filtration.

Understanding this difference is critical because it highlights why we all need to be mindful of what enters storm drains. By keeping storm drains free of anything but clean rainwater, residents help protect local water quality, reduce pollution, and safeguard the fish, birds, and other wildlife that depend on healthy streams and lakes. Small actions, like properly disposing of household waste, using fertilizers responsibly, and never dumping anything into the storm drain, go a long way toward preserving our community's water resources
