Animal Shelter Announces New Hours Beginning January 5

The Moore Animal Shelter, 3500 S. I-35 Service Rd., has adjusted its hours to better serve the community and provide increased access for residents interested in adoption services. The Adoption Center now offers extended weekday hours and will be closed on Sundays and Mondays, allowing for more consistent

staffing and improved customer service during peak visitation times. With these updated hours, the Adoption Center will be open to the public for 43 hours each week, representing an increase of 8 additional hours. This expanded availability gives residents more flexibility to visit the shelter, meet adoptable pets, and complete adoptions; ultimately helping more animals find loving homes. Residents are encouraged to plan their visits accordingly, and the shelter looks forward to continuing to serve the community with these improved hours. 🐾

Fee Changes

Effective 02/02/26, the City will be changing payment card processors. Processing fees will now be paid by the payee at the time of payment. The debit/credit card processing fee will be updated to 2.95%, or a minimum

of \$1.50 per utility billing or municipal court transaction. Additional processing fees may apply.

E-Check Option for Payments

The City will offer an E-Check option for payments. A flat fee of \$0.50 will be charged per payment transaction. To avoid processing fees, please pay with cash or check; in person or by mail.

Guest Columnist this month is Moore's
City Manager, Brooks Mitchell.

Since 2000, the population of the
City of Moore has increased by 53%.
Our city continues to grow, as
evidenced by the eight housing
developments currently underway.
With growth comes increased
demand for street and drainage
infrastructure, as well as public
safety. These are good problems to
have, and the challenge is finding
the most cost-efficient way to pay
for them. Currently, a General
Obligation Bond (GO Bond)
program is utilized to fund capital
improvements. This has been the
preferred method for many years
and has remained in place during
my tenure as City Manager. As
economic conditions change, is it
still the best way? Beginning with
the November 3, 2025 City Council
meeting, we have had discussions
about winding down our GO Bond
program and asking the residents
to consider a dedicated capital
project and public safety one-cent
sales tax increase. If approved, this
would provide a consistent funding
source for streets, drainage, public
safety, and, over time, **reduce** the
amount of property tax residents
pay to the City of Moore. The City
Council is expected to approve
placing this proposition on the April
7, 2026 ballot at its meeting on
February 2, 2026. Please check our
