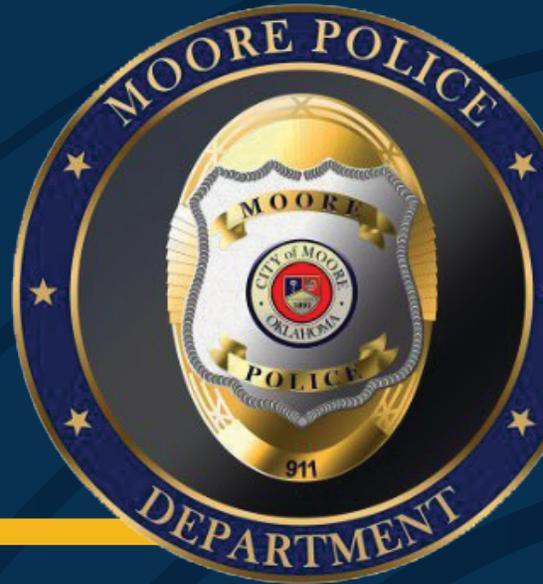




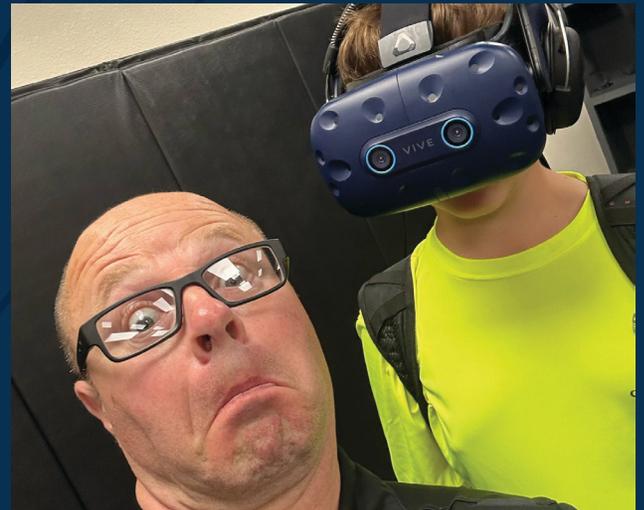
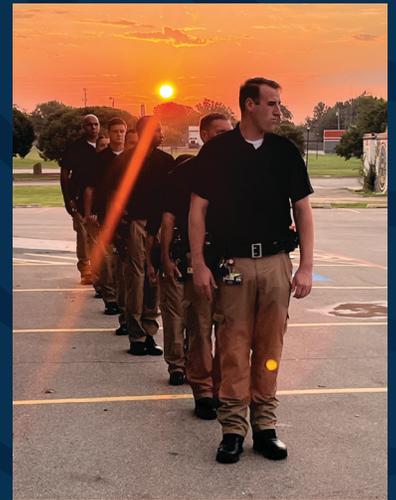

OUR LEADERSHIP



CHIEF TODD GIBSON

Chief Todd Gibson brings a lifetime of distinguished public service and law enforcement leadership to the Moore Police Department. Appointed Chief of Police in April 2020, he previously served as the Cleveland County Sheriff and retired from the Norman Police Department in 2016 as a Captain, following a career that began in the 1990s.

During his tenure with the Norman Police Department, Chief Gibson held numerous leadership roles, including Project Manager for the Police Investigation Center and

Commander of the Criminal Investigations Division. He also served as Police Incident Commander for multiple major natural disasters in Cleveland County, including the 2010 and 2013 tornadoes. His leadership experience includes commanding the Norman Police Tactical Team, coordinating public safety operations for University of Oklahoma football games, and overseeing five officer-involved shooting investigations. His service was recognized with multiple honors, including Warr Acres Officer of the Year in 1996 and 1997, and Norman Police Supervisor of the Year in 2012.

As Cleveland County Sheriff, Chief Gibson implemented innovative programs and initiatives that modernized operations and advanced the profession statewide. He led major technology and equipment upgrades totaling millions of dollars, elevating the Sheriff's Office into the 21st century. His leadership emphasized organizational excellence, operational efficiency, and

progressive policing strategies.

Chief Gibson is widely recognized as a leader in Oklahoma law enforcement. He currently serves as President of the Oklahoma Association of Chiefs of Police (OACP) and actively trains police leaders in organizational leadership and culture development. In recognition of his contributions and leadership, he was honored as the 2024 State of Oklahoma Large Agency Chief of the Year.

Chief Gibson holds a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice and a Master's Degree in Public Administration/Public Safety. Beyond law enforcement, he remains actively engaged in community and nonprofit leadership, serving as Vice Chairman of the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Commission and Vice Chairman of the Cleveland County Health Board, along with involvement in several nonprofit organizations and his church.

Chief Gibson resides in Moore with his wife, Johanna, and their four children: Kyleigh, Caleb, Shylah, and Cade.

DEPUTY CHIEF BLAKE GREEN

The Moore Police Department welcomed Deputy Chief Blake Green in December 2020. He is known for reminding members of the organization that the Moore Police Department is the "Promised Land" and that it is always a "Good Day to be at the Moore Police Department." He is truly grateful for the many blessings he has been afforded, especially the support of his wife and children.

Deputy Chief Green began his law enforcement career in 1993 as a Reserve Police Officer. He served 23 years with the Norman Police Department, where he was named Officer of the Year in 1997. He retired at the rank of Captain, having served as West Geographical Commander, Criminal Investigations Commander, and SWAT Commander. He also served for many years on the department's nationally recognized Pistol Team, including as its Commander, and holds numerous firearms instructor and

National Incident Management System (NIMS) certifications.

Deputy Chief Green is a longtime member of Emmaus Baptist Church and has served as a board member for several nonprofit organizations, including Bethesda, Community Services Building, Inc., and the Salvation Army. In 2017, Deputy Chief Green joined the Cleveland County Sheriff's Office as Undersheriff and later served as Interim Sheriff in 2020, a year marked by the COVID-19 pandemic and nationwide protests.

His education includes a Master's Degree in Public Safety, with honors, from Liberty University, as well as a Graduate Certificate in Criminal Justice from the University of Virginia. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from East Central University. He is a graduate of the 289th Session of the FBI National Academy, the 81st Session of the Department of Justice Law



Enforcement Executive Development Seminar, and completed the Senior Management Institute for Police in Boston in 2017. He has also completed the FBI-LEEDA Trilogy of Supervisor, Command, and Executive Leadership programs.

OUR LEADERSHIP



MAJOR CHRISTOPHER MADDOCKS

Major Chris Maddocks commenced his law enforcement career in 1995 with the Muskogee County Sheriff's Department. He joined the Moore Police Department in 1997 as a communications officer and subsequently became a police officer in 1998. As a Sergeant, he was assigned to the Patrol Division, Detective Division, and the 21st Judiciary Task Force, where he managed a general case load and multiple narcotics-related crimes throughout the State of Oklahoma. Promoted to Lieutenant in 2012, he assumed first-line supervision over several patrol shifts. In 2019, he was promoted to the rank of Captain and was assigned to an administrative

position, overseeing the Support Services Division of the department. In 2024, he was promoted to the rank of Major and was assigned to the Support Services Bureau of the police department.

Throughout his career, Major Maddocks has overseen numerous projects for the department, including the volunteer program, retiree involvement initiative, and "Supervisor for a Day" program. He has received extensive leadership training, including FBI-LEEDA Trilogy (Supervisor, Command, and Executive Leadership), FBI-LEEDA conducting and managing internal affairs investigations, and new Chief's training.



MAJOR KYLE DUDLEY

Major Kyle Dudley is a lifelong resident of Moore. He graduated from Moore High School in 1994. He started his career in law enforcement in 1998 at the Cleveland County Sheriff's Department. He joined the Moore Police Department in 2000. While a Patrol Officer, he was assigned as a Field Training Officer. He was a School Resource Officer at Moore High School before joining the Investigations Division in 2008. In Investigations, he worked cold cases, general felony crimes, and a white-collar caseload. Major Dudley was promoted to Lieutenant in 2011 and was assigned to all three patrol shifts and the

Support Services Division. He was promoted to Captain in 2020 and assigned to patrol and later Support Services. He is a graduate of the Criminal Investigations Academy (CIA-48), the 111th International Law Enforcement Academy School of Police Supervision, the Oklahoma Association of Chiefs of Police Administrative and Command Staff Training, the 745th FBI-LEEDA Supervisor Leadership Institute, the 728th FBI-LEEDA Command Leadership Institute, the 406th FBI-LEEDA Executive Leadership Institute, and the 151st Southern Police Institute Administrative Officers Course. Kyle and his wife, Christa, have three sons: Connor, Kaleb, and Tyler.



CHIEF EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT SUSAN RUTH

Susan Ruth has dedicated 29 years of her career to serving the City of Moore, holding the position of Chief's Executive Assistant. Throughout her tenure, she has contributed significantly to the operations of the police department, assisting in various administrative and leadership tasks that have helped shape the department's efficiency and success.

Beyond her role in the police department, Susan is one of the two founders of the Law Enforcement Assistant Leadership Network (LEALN), an organization aimed at supporting leadership development within law enforcement.

Susan also serves as an advisory board member for the MPAC Foundation, where she has been recognized for her dedication to community service

and support of law enforcement initiatives. Her outstanding contributions to both the foundation and the community earned her the prestigious Civilian of the Year Award from the MPAC Foundation in 2024.

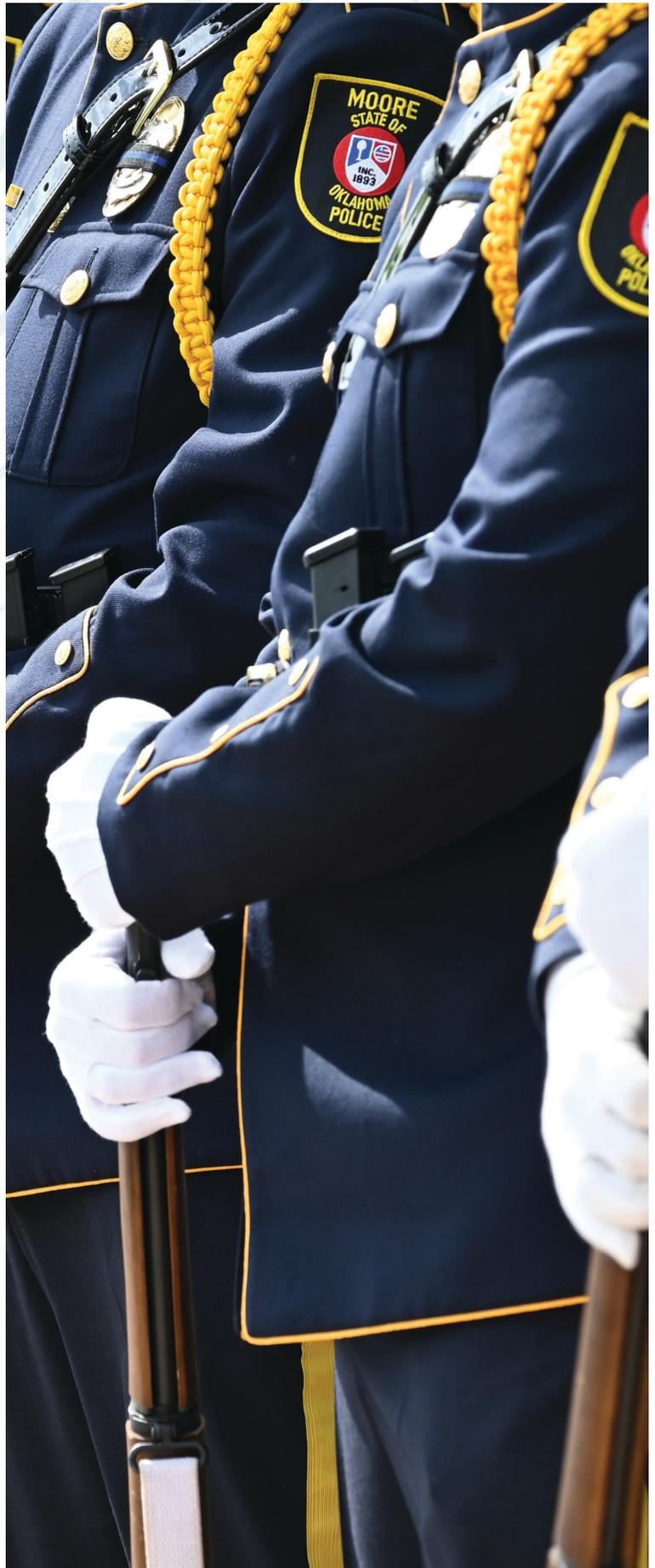

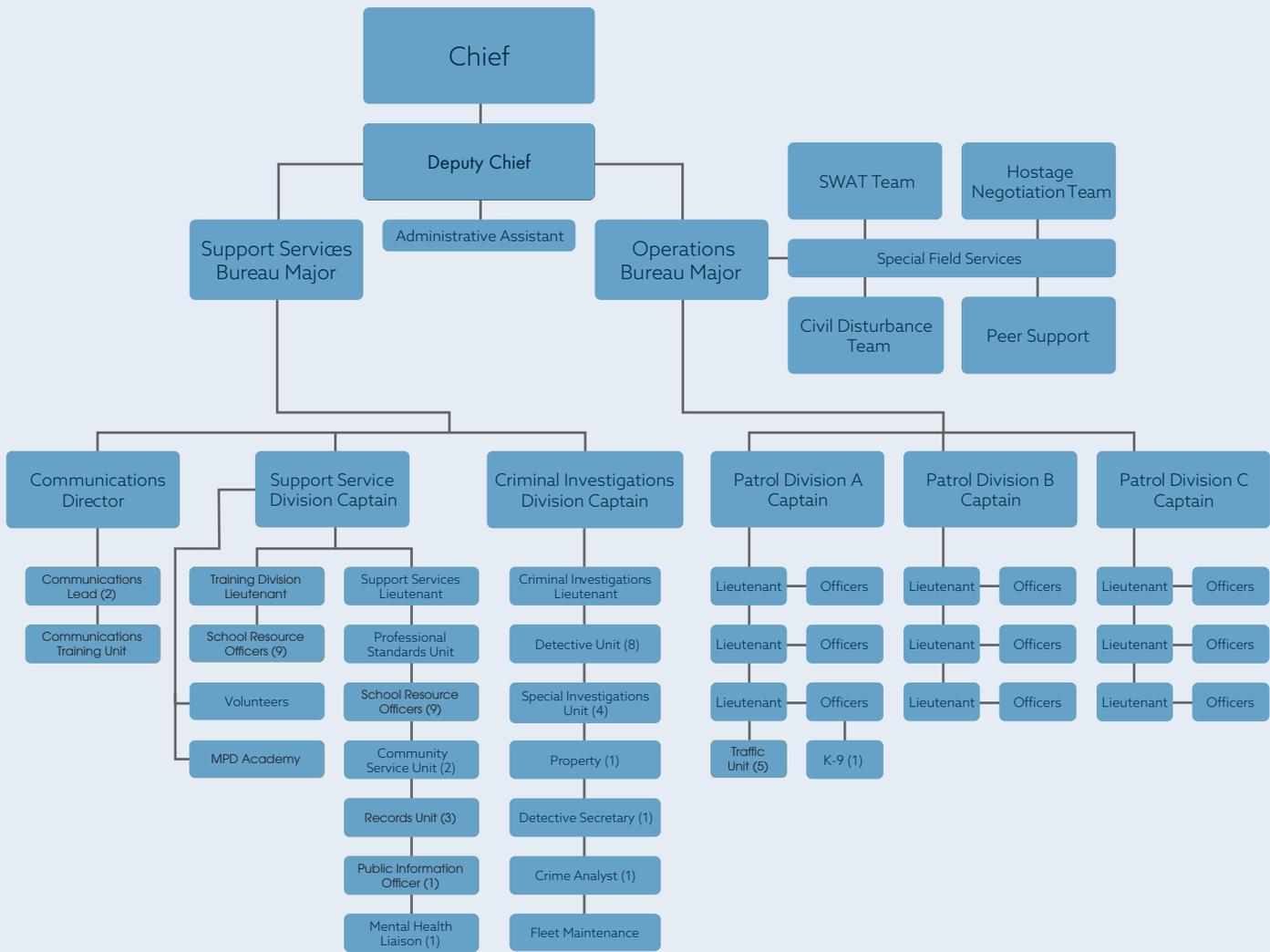

2025 HIGHLIGHTS

The Moore Police Department remains committed to side-by-side policing, a philosophy grounded in partnership, trust, and shared responsibility. In 2025, our department reached new milestones in community engagement, operational excellence, and regional safety.

INVESTIGATIVE EXCELLENCE (CID)

The **Criminal Investigations Division (CID)** utilized advanced technology and regional task forces to remove dangerous drugs and offenders from our streets.

- **Major Seizures:** Task force operations led to the seizure of over \$1.5 million in drug proceeds and more than 14,000 lbs. of illegal marijuana.
- **Digital Forensics:** Specialized investigators conducted residential search warrants for child sexual abuse material, leading to multiple arrests.

FEATURED ON "ON PATROL: LIVE"

In 2025, the Moore Police Department gained national attention through our partnership with the television program **On Patrol: Live**.

- **Transparency in Action:** This feature allowed viewers across the country to see the professionalism and dedication of our officers in real-time.
- **Community Pride:** The program highlighted the unique challenges of policing in Moore and professionalism to a wide audience.

COMMUNITY IMPACT & ENGAGEMENT

Our **Community Service Unit (CSU)** saw record-breaking participation as we worked to strengthen the bond between officers and residents.

- **National Night Out:** Welcomed over 7,000 residents, the largest turnout in its 14-year history.
- **Burgers & Badges:** Served more than 2,500 community members.
- **Special Olympics:** Recognized with the Courage Award after raising over \$10,000 for Special Olympics Oklahoma.

SPECIALIZED RESPONSE & SAFETY

- **South Metro SWAT:** Successfully apprehended high-risk suspects wanted for aggravated kidnapping and arson. The team also provided security for the NBA Finals Game 7 and Championship Parade.
- **Hostage Negotiation:** Our team took 4th place at the Crisis Negotiation Annual Competition at Texas State University.

MODERNIZING OPERATIONS

- **Fleet Upgrades:** Added six new Ford Explorer Interceptor vehicles and upgraded tactical fender wraps to reduce vehicle damage.
- **Training Excellence:** Moore police officers averaged approximately 147 hours of in-service training per officer in 2025.
- **911 Communications:** Implemented new Police Protocols for standardized call handling and transitioned to a modern scheduling platform.

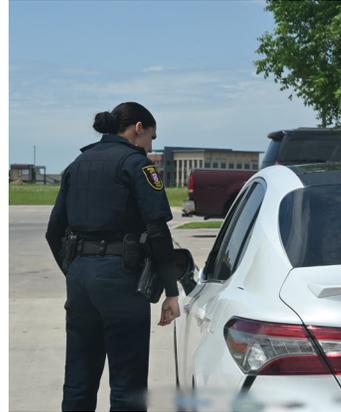

PATROL INITIATIVES

THE “THREE TWO’S” INITIATIVE: LEADING THROUGH SERVICE

As the City of Moore grows, the Moore Police Department remains committed to a philosophy where leadership is practiced, not just positioned. To meet the demands of a modern, expanding suburban landscape, we implemented the **Three Two’s Initiative**, a structured model that transforms routine patrol into deliberate community impact.

THE FORMULA FOR ENGAGEMENT

The initiative is built on a simple, measurable framework that ensures proactive policing is institutionalized across all shifts:

- **3 Guiding Principles:** Ownership, Engagement, and Measurable Impact.
- **2 Projects:** Per Lieutenant, per month.
- **2 Officers:** Working alongside the Lieutenant per project.
- **2 Hours:** Minimum of structured engagement per project.

PUBLIC SAFETY RESULTS

- **Pedestrian & Crosswalk Safety:** Officers identified high-risk crossing areas through crash analysis. By focusing on education and high-visibility enforcement, we achieved a 70% reduction in fatal auto-pedestrian collisions.
- **School Zone Modernization:** 100% Transition of city school zones to “all-day” active status to enhance student safety. Based on citizen feedback and geographic analysis of congestion, the initiative led to the transition of all Moore school zones to “all-day” active status, providing consistent safety for students regardless of the time of day.
- **Winter Weather Guardianship:** During severe storms, officers moved beyond emergency response to clear driveways for elderly residents and mitigate hazards, reinforcing the role of the police as community guardians.

THE RESULT

Over **288 documented community-based projects** annually, ensuring that proactive service is part of our daily DNA. By allowing officers to identify community problems and implement creative solutions, we foster a purpose-driven culture.



SPECIAL WEAPONS & TACTICS (SWAT)

SOUTH METRO SWAT

The mission of South Metro SWAT is to provide specialized tactical response to ensure the safety and protection of the public, law enforcement personnel, and involved parties. Team activations are utilized for incidents beyond the scope of standard patrol operations, including armed and violent offender apprehensions, hostage and barricaded suspect situations, high-risk search warrants, large-scale event security, and other critical incidents requiring specialized training and resources.

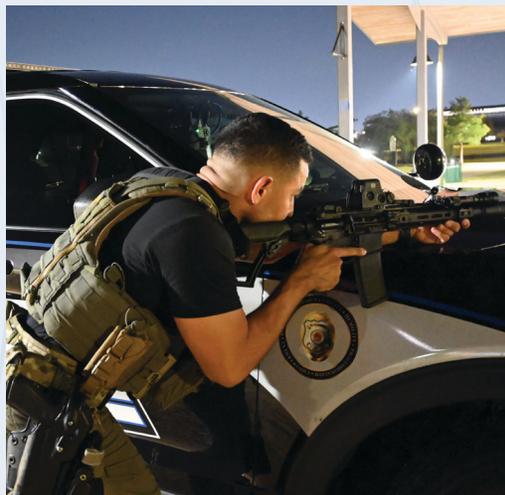
South Metro SWAT continued its growth in 2025 as a multi-jurisdictional tactical team serving Cleveland County. The team is comprised of operators from the Moore Police Department, Norman Police Department, University of Oklahoma Police Department, Cleveland County Sheriff's Office, and medical personnel from Norman Regional EMSTAT and the Norman Fire Department. This collaborative structure strengthens regional response capabilities and ensures a unified approach to high-risk incidents.

At the conclusion of 2025, South Metro SWAT recognized the retirement of four operators—three from the Moore Police Department and one from the Norman Police Department. The team extends its sincere appreciation to **Sgt. Stromski, Sgt. Landrum, Lt. Clarkston, and Sgt. McGuire** (Norman) for their years of dedicated service. These retirements created opportunities for participating agencies to enhance staffing, resulting in the addition of six new operators.

Throughout 2025, South Metro SWAT provided mutual aid and operational support to multiple agencies. The team assisted Lighthorse Police with the apprehension of a suspect who intentionally set fire to a McClain County deputy's residence while the family was inside. South Metro SWAT also assisted the Wichita Falls Police Department with the apprehension of a suspect wanted for burglary, robbery, and aggravated kidnapping. Both operations concluded with suspects being taken safely into custody.

Additionally, South Metro SWAT supported the Oklahoma City Police Department by providing event security during the NBA Finals Game 7 and the subsequent Championship Parade. During post-game celebrations, operators intervened and took a suspect into custody after the individual displayed a firearm toward a spectator, preventing further escalation.

Beyond tactical operations, South Metro SWAT remained committed to community engagement in 2025. Team members participated in outreach events including **National Night Out** and **Burgers and Badges**, offering opportunities for community members to interact with operators, view specialized equipment, and gain a better understanding of the team's mission, capabilities, and commitment to public safety.



HOSTAGE NEGOTIATION TEAM

The Moore Police Department's **Hostage Negotiation Team** was founded in 1996 by since retired **Lieutenant Daniel Melendez**. This team specializes in de-escalation through verbal communication during critical incidents with the goal of saving lives. This team is part of the South Metro SWAT Negotiation team, which also includes negotiators from the Norman Police Department, Cleveland County Sheriff's Office, and OU Police Department. Moore Police Department's Hostage Negotiation Team currently consists of 9

commissioned officers and one civilian mental health liaison. All team members have attended the FBI Negotiator training course. In 2025, members of the Moore Police Department and Norman Police Department negotiator teams took 4th place at the Crisis Negotiation Annual Competition held at Texas State University in San Marcos, Texas. The team lost a highly experienced **Commander in Lt. Matthew Morrow** in 2025 as he has moved on to other opportunities within the police department.

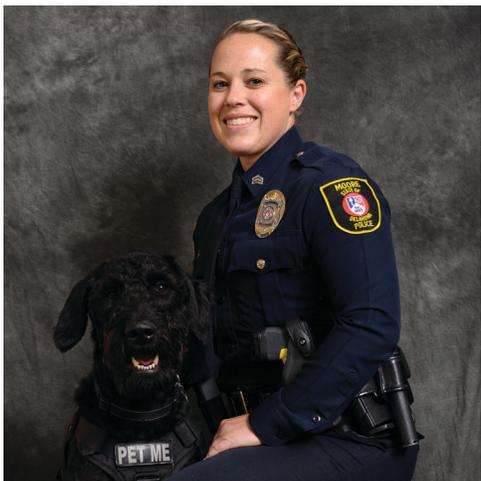
MENTAL HEALTH LIAISON

Tania Woods is the City of Moore's mental health liaison and assists all city employees with their mental well-being. **Ellie Mae Moore** is one of two therapy dogs at the Moore Police Department. Tania and Ellie provide therapeutic services to city employees while also providing referrals for their family members. Tania and Ellie have started working with Crisis Intervention Team officer MGST. Wallace is responding to active mental health calls. This Co-Responder team also proactively visits community members who have mental health and/or substance abuse issues to check their welfare and reduce crises in the community. The co-responder team also assists in providing resources to the homeless population and has started interacting with the Cleveland County mental health court to better assist our community. Tania is also a team member on the police department's hostage negotiation and peer support teams.

Sara Gurchinoff, Leo provides comfort and emotional support to victims of crime, individuals experiencing mental health crises, children, and community members during difficult moments.

In addition to patrol duties, Leo regularly participates in career days at local high schools and colleges, as well as special

events throughout the city, helping strengthen positive connections between the Moore Police Department and the community. When not in the field, Leo continues to support department morale by providing comfort, encouragement, and plenty of smiles to MPD officers, dispatchers, and civilian staff.

Leo's presence brings meaningful joy, compassion, and connection to both the Moore Police Department and the community we proudly serve.

SJAAK / SERGEANT BRYCE WHITE

Sjaak is a 5-year-old Belgian Malinois and German Shepherd mix who works alongside his handler, Sgt. Bryce White is currently assigned to the District 21 Drug and Violent Crime Task Force. K9 Sjaak plays a critical role in interdicting illegal narcotics and preventing drug trafficking along major highway corridors throughout the state of Oklahoma.

Over the past year, Sjaak has continued to excel in advanced training and consistently

demonstrates a strong work ethic, focus, and drive in the field. His dedication and reliability make him a valuable asset in supporting regional drug enforcement efforts and enhancing public safety.

When off duty, Sjaak enjoys playing fetch and spending time with his handler's family, showcasing the loyal and personable nature that complements his professional excellence.



VITO / SERGEANT JEREMIE MILLER

Vito is a 10-year-old Belgian Malinois from AmeriK9 Kennels in Oklahoma and serves as a high-drive, highly social K9 alongside his handler, Sgt. Jeremie Miller. The team has worked together on patrol for approximately nine years, contributing significantly to public safety and crime prevention efforts within the community.

Throughout their service, Vito and Sgt. Miller has successfully removed substantial quantities of illegal narcotics from the streets and assisted in the

apprehension of numerous criminal suspects. In addition to supporting Moore Police Department operations, the team frequently assists surrounding law enforcement agencies, strengthening regional collaboration and public safety efforts.

Vito's dedication, reliability, and exceptional working ability continue to make him an asset to the Moore Police Department and the communities he serves.

The Training Division has had a highly successful year focused on fostering strong relationships and expanding its impact beyond the police department to serve the City of Moore as a whole. Throughout the year, the division hosted and supported numerous classes and events for City of Moore services, public meetings, the MPAC Foundation luncheon, and various other city-related initiatives.

In addition, the Training Division hosted training for the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics, which allowed numerous Moore officers to receive Force-on-Force Simunitions Instructor certification, which included scenario-based training. The division also supported neighboring partners such as Metro Tech, Oklahoma County Sheriff's Department, and the ABLE Commission by assisting with a wide range of training needs across the state.

This year marked a significant milestone as the Training Division graduated its first police academy and is scheduled to graduate its second basic police academy in February 2026. The division also hosted

five weeks of in-service training, LEDT refreshers, and multiple "Roll with the Chiefs" classes at the MPAC Center. In 2025, Moore police officers averaged approximately 147 hours of in-service training per officer, and the division continues to seek additional opportunities to enhance training department-wide. The Firearms Cadre remained highly active, securing open range days when available by trading training services with partner agencies.

Looking ahead to 2026, the Training Division will begin a new academy in mid-July. The division remains committed to strengthening partnerships with neighboring agencies and expanding training opportunities. Planned offerings include courtroom testimony, Taser certification, Force-on-Force training, building clearing, high-risk traffic stops, and two days of firearms training. The goal remains for the Moore Police Department to continue setting the standard across the state for well-trained, professional police officers. We will also host District 21 task force in various classes.



HONOR GUARD



The Moore Police Department **Honor Guard** grew to 16 members in 2025 and participated in 34 events, an increase from the previous year. The unit, composed of patrol officers and school resource officers, participated in funerals, parades, and major ceremonial events, including the opening ceremonies for the **Special Olympics, Oklahoma City Thunder, Bedlam softball, NBA Western Conference Finals, and the NCAA College World Series**. The unit had the honor of presenting the colors in Game 5 of the NBA Finals and all three of the NCAA College World Series championship games. The Honor Guard also hosted a 40-hour advanced Honor Guard school with participation from metro police and fire agencies and conducted four quarterly training sessions, including multi-agency funeral simulations and rehearsals for the Cleveland County Memorial.

INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

REFLECTING ON A YEAR OF SERVICE: MOORE POLICE DEPARTMENT INTERNSHIP PROGRAM 2025

In 2025, the Moore Police Department successfully hosted three internship programs during the Spring, Summer, and Fall semesters, continuing its commitment to developing future public safety professionals and strengthening community connections. The program provided students from various educational institutions with hands-on experience and valuable insight into the daily operations of a modern police department.

Interns participated in a wide range of activities, including administrative assignments, patrol ride-alongs, off-site training courses, and a community service project with the **Mary Abbott Children's House** in Cleveland County. Under the guidance of experienced officers, interns observed real-world policing

scenarios such as traffic stops, investigations, and community outreach initiatives.

Participants also gained exposure to specialized units, including K-9, SWAT, and forensic investigations, learning how each plays a vital role in public safety. Community engagement remained a central focus, with interns assisting at safety events, school visits, and charitable programs, reinforcing the importance of positive police-community relationships.

As the year concluded, several interns expressed interest in pursuing careers in law enforcement, highlighting the program's lasting impact. The Moore Police Department remains committed to providing a meaningful, educational experience that bridges classroom learning with real-world service.



VOLUNTEER PROGRAM



The Citizen Volunteer Program remains a valuable resource to both the Moore Police Department and the community it serves. The unit is comprised of four dedicated volunteers: **Amanda Maldonado, Tom Poyser, Nancy Vancamp, Valarie Asner, and Perry Zimmerman.**

Volunteers play a vital role in supporting community engagement events such as **Shop with a Cop, Coats for Kids, Burgers and Badges, and National Night Out.** Their contributions are instrumental to the success of these events and strengthen positive relationships between the department and the community. In addition to event support, volunteers assist with police records, the detective's division, fleet maintenance, **Meals on Wheels,** and other essential functions.

These individuals exemplify the department's mission, vision, and values by consistently demonstrating service before self and dedicating

their personal time to the community. In 2025, Citizen Volunteers logged approximately 1,200 hours of service, representing an estimated value of \$32,000.

Toward the end of 2025, **Volunteer Coordinator Ann Davis** announced her retirement from the program. We extend our gratitude to Ann for her years of dedicated service to the Moore Police Department and the community. Ann was instrumental in the development and success of the Citizen Volunteer Program and served as its foundation during its early stages. Without her commitment and leadership, the program would not be where it is today.

We also congratulate **Amanda Maldonado** on her appointment as the new Volunteer Coordinator and look forward to her continued leadership and growth of this program.



PROPERTY & EVIDENCE



In 2025 **Property and Evidence Division** was run by civilian employee **Angela Berry** and commissioned officer **Sgt. Mary Williams**. Berry is a Certified Property and Evidence Specialist through the **International Association for Property and Evidence (IAPE)**. Berry is the secretary of the Oklahoma Property & Evidence Association. Berry also wrote a book, "Narcen Your Property & Evidence Room," on the steps to take to transform a disorganized property and evidence room into a functional success. Berry and Williams ensure that any property or evidence is maintained and stored in a secure environment.

The duties associated with the position of Property and Evidence Technician are many. They include maintaining incoming property in an organized fashion where it can be quickly located, maintaining the chain of custody of property booked in or out, and preparing the property room for quarterly audits and annual inventories. A full inventory was done in October, which accounted for a total of 11,071 items in the Property Room. Berry has filled 142 DA requests for body cam, dash cam, and digital evidence. This year, Berry and Sgt. Williams attended training with IAPE to maintain and enhance their skills in **Evidence Storage and Management**.

RECORDS DIVISION

The Moore Police Department **Records Division** serves the citizens of the City of Moore by providing a plethora of services. These services include inputting officer impound reports, handling impound releases, transferring vehicle accident data from OCERs to the department's report writing system, printing OCER accident reports for citizens, mailing impaired driving documentation to DPS, processing expungements, completing NCIC background check requests, and forwarding domestic lethality screens to the state.

FLEET VEHICLES

In 2025, the Moore Police Department added six new **Ford Explorer Police Interceptor Utility (PIU)** vehicles to the patrol fleet, enhancing reliability and operational readiness. The department also began upgrading its **Tactical Vehicle Intervention (TVI)** fender wraps to a heavier steel design. This upgrade provides increased contact surface area and significantly reduces vehicle damage during tactical maneuvers, improving both safety and fleet longevity.



911 DISPATCH/COMMUNICATIONS



This year marked significant progress for the **Emergency Communications Center** as we continued to modernize operations, invest in our team, and strengthen public safety services for the community.

One of the year's major accomplishments was the implementation of Police Protocols, which provide a standardized, best-practice approach to handling police-related calls for service. These protocols support consistent call processing, improve information gathering, and help ensure responding officers receive accurate and timely information.

The center also transitioned to a new scheduling platform, Microsoft Teams SHIFTS, improving efficiency, transparency, and communication related to staffing. This modern system allows schedules to be managed more effectively while providing staff with clear, real-time access to their work schedules.

Staffing and training remained a top priority. The center released three newly trained dispatchers to independent duty and hired five new dispatchers to support current operations and future growth. Additionally, a new training manual was introduced, ensuring consistent training standards and supporting high-quality service delivery.

We are proud to recognize **Grayson Christensen** as Dispatcher of the Year for her exceptional professionalism, dedication, and commitment to serving both the community and her colleagues.

Together, these accomplishments reflect our ongoing commitment to providing reliable, professional, and compassionate emergency communications services to the residents we serve.

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS MANAGER MANDY MASON



Mandy Mason was born and raised in Tulsa, Oklahoma. In 2006, she relocated to Norman to attend the University of Oklahoma and developed a strong connection to the Moore–Norman community, where she chose to establish her career and family.

Ms. Mason began her public safety career in 2014 with the City of Oklahoma City as an Emergency Communications Dispatcher. During her tenure, she gained valuable frontline experience before transitioning into administrative and operational support roles, where she built a strong foundation in organizational leadership and public safety operations.

In 2019, Ms. Mason earned her Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, followed by a Master of Business Administration in 2021. Her academic background has supported her advancement into leadership, training, and administrative roles within emergency communications.

During this time, she oversaw numerous large-scale projects, including the implementation of a human resources recruitment software and the development of a new recruitment program. SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

Moore Public Schools (MPS) and the Moore Police Department (MPD) partner to provide comprehensive safety and security services for students throughout the City of Moore. This partnership began more than 20 years ago at Moore High School and has since expanded to include nine School Resource Officers (SROs). Together, MPD and MPS share an unwavering commitment to student and staff safety and to fostering a secure, supportive educational environment.

The responsibilities of a Moore Police Department SRO extend well beyond the traditional school day. SROs support a wide range of extracurricular activities, including school dances, athletic events, student orientations, summer school, and other campus events. In addition, SROs coordinate summer initiatives such as the Moore

Police Department Junior Cadet Program and the High School Cadet Program.

These cadet programs have proven to be highly successful, offering students firsthand exposure to law enforcement training and the tools used in policing. Through these experiences, students gain valuable insight into public safety careers while building positive relationships with officers.

The Moore Police Department remains proud to serve within Moore Public Schools and is committed to doing so with professionalism, dignity, and integrity. By working side by side with the community, MPD continues to strengthen its positive collaboration with the Moore Public Schools system.

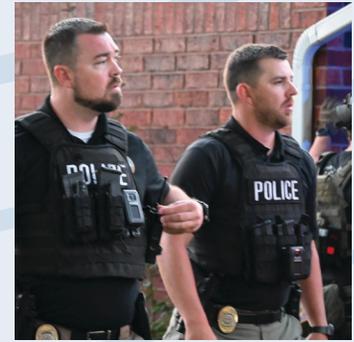

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION



The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) of the Moore Police Department consists of 10 qualified investigators trained to handle criminal investigations. MPD investigators have specialized training in interview and interrogation, search and seizure, and crime scene processing. Members of CID manage a strenuous case load, conduct follow-up investigations on reports generated by the Operations Division, and work with the Cleveland County District Attorney’s Office as well as the Office of the Municipal Prosecutor in the prosecution of crimes committed in the City of Moore. The CID is also responsible for conducting background investigations for prospective new officers, dispatchers, civilian personnel, and volunteers.

The Crimes Against Children investigators focus on cases involving child victim crimes, including internet crimes against children. During 2025, Moore Police Department Crimes Against Children investigators conducted several residential search warrants directly related to the distribution of child sexual abuse material, which led to the arrest and prosecution of multiple offenders. Technology plays a large role in these investigations. Detective Ballard has specialized training in digital forensics and assists all investigators in processing evidence such as cell phones, computers, and many other forms of digital media.

Three members of CID are assigned as Task Force Officers to agencies outside the Moore Police Department. These agencies include the District 21 Task Force, District 21 Interdiction Unit, and Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Marijuana Task Force. The investigations completed by these units have led to the seizure of over \$1.5 million in drug proceeds, over 100 arrests and the seizure of several firearms.

Moore Police Department CID has a new task force officer position with the FBI Joint Terrorism Task Force beginning January 2026.

Crime Analyst Catie Byrd continues to prove herself as an invaluable asset to CID and the Moore Police Department. Catie routinely assists investigators and patrol officers with locating offenders as well as researching suspects and addresses in preparation for search warrant services.

Det. David Grant was recognized as the 2025 Detective of the Year. Det. Grant is generally assigned cases more serious in nature and played a pivotal role in the investigation of several high-profile cases during 2025 including an officer involved shooting. Det. Grant also oversees the technical investigator program which provides patrolmen with additional training to assist with crime scene investigations. Det. Grant is the lead Crime Scene Investigator and as a result is often dispatched to crime scenes even when he is not on call..

This past year, the Moore Police Department participated in multiple Special Olympic events, including **Polar Plunge**, **Torch Run**, **Tip-A-Cop**, **Cops on Top of Coffee Shop**, **Bouquets & Badges**, and **Summer Games** in Stillwater. MPD and the Law Enforcement Torch Run (LETR) are committed to supporting our Special Olympians each and every year.



COMMUNITY SERVICE UNIT

The mission of the **Moore Police Community Service Unit (CSU)** is to reduce crime and improve the quality of life through proactive outreach and innovative partnerships. As one of the most active community policing units in Oklahoma, the CSU builds long-term relationships that go far beyond traditional law enforcement.

2025: A YEAR OF RECORD-BREAKING ENGAGEMENT

Community demand for CSU programming reached an all-time high in 2025, with the unit participating in more than 20 events per month.

- **National Night Out:** Welcomed over 7,000 residents, the largest turnout in its 14-year history.
- **Burgers & Badges:** Served more than 2,500 community members at our largest fall event to date.
- **New Initiatives:** Launched Cones and Cops and Scoops for Success to provide recreational engagement and attendance rewards in high-need neighborhoods and schools.

INVESTING IN OUR YOUTH

The CSU is committed to mentoring the next generation through hands-on education and recruitment pipelines:

- **Cadet Academies:** Operates Junior High and High School academies to foster leadership.
- **Internship Program:** A tri-annual program providing college students with professional public safety exposure.
- **School Mentorship:** Direct engagement through Kops & Kids and speaking roles with Criminal Justice Cadets at Francis Tuttle.

SIGNATURE PROGRAMS & VITAL PARTNERSHIPS

From seasonal outreach to crime prevention, the CSU oversees a diverse portfolio of programs, including:

- **Community Classics:** Shop with a Cop, Coffee with a Cop, Coats from Cops, and Cops & Bobbers.
- **Public Safety:** DEA Drug Take-Back, Citizens Academy, and Crime Free Multi-Housing.
- **Essential Support:** Partnerships with local nonprofits allow officers to provide hygiene kits and basic needs supplies directly to families in financial hardship.

STRENGTH IN NUMBERS

Our impact is amplified by strong partnerships with organizations like the Oklahoma City Thunder, OU Athletics, Niagara Bottled Water, and Great Plains Western Bank, alongside numerous local businesses.

Through record-setting participation and creative outreach, the CSU continues to strengthen the bond between the Moore Police Department and the citizens we serve.

COFFEE WITH A COP

Building trust, one cup at a time. Coffee with a Cop provides a unique opportunity for Moore officers to step outside their patrol cars and engage with the community in a relaxed setting. From Black Rifle Coffee to local McDonald's and Starbucks locations, these meetings allow us to learn firsthand from our neighbors how we can most effectively serve the City of Moore.





KOPS-N-KIDS

The Moore Police Department's youth outreach program continues to grow rapidly. Originally serving 24 students at Kelley Elementary, the program has now expanded throughout the Moore Public School District. These after-school sessions provide a vital space for officers to connect with at-risk youth, transforming potential barriers into positive partnerships. We believe that by investing in our youngest residents today, we are securing a stronger community for tomorrow.



SHOP WITH A COP

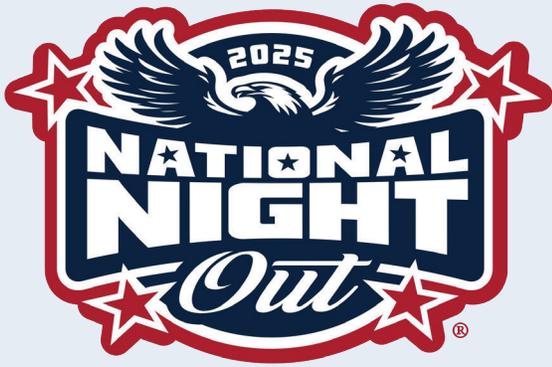

FILL THE TRAILER

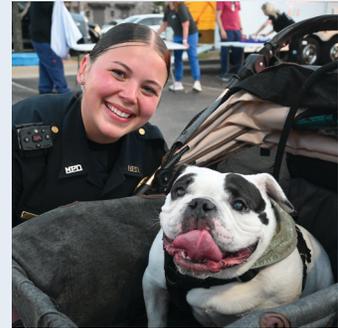

CITIZENS ACADEMY

In 2025, the Moore Police Department proudly hosted two **Citizens Academies**, one in the spring and one in the fall, with each academy spanning nine weeks. A total of 24 community members participated in these sessions, gaining an in-depth look at the operations, values, and responsibilities of modern law enforcement.

Participants received hands-on and classroom instruction covering the department's mission, vision, and core values, as well as practical training in defensive tactics, driving operations, firearms safety and handling, investigations, and community policing strategies. The program provides citizens with a transparent and educational experience, allowing them to better understand the complexities of police work while

fostering trust and stronger relationships between the department and the community.

Since the Community Services Unit assumed oversight of the Citizens Academy, approximately 70 citizens have completed the program. The academy continues to serve as a strong pipeline for community involvement, with many graduates choosing to remain engaged through the department's volunteer program and other civic partnerships.

The Citizens Academy remains one of MPD's most effective community engagement initiatives, strengthening public trust, promoting education, and building long-term partnerships with the residents we proudly serve.



CADET & JR. CADET ACADEMY

Each summer, the Moore Police Department hosts both a **High School Cadet Academy** and a **Junior High Cadet Academy** for students within the Moore Public Schools District. These academies strengthen relationships between officers and students while providing meaningful insight into the responsibilities, training, and expectations of a career in law enforcement.

The High School Cadet Academy serves students in grades 10 through 12 and offers hands-on training experiences in areas such as crime scene investigation, law enforcement driver training, SWAT active shooter response, defensive tactics, and courtroom testimony. Participants also gain real-world exposure through ride-alongs with

patrol officers, allowing them to observe daily police operations firsthand.

The Junior High Cadet Academy is designed for students in grades 7 and 8 and provides an age-appropriate introduction to public safety concepts. While scaled to meet developmental needs, the academy covers important topics including mental health awareness, dangerous drugs education, crime scene fundamentals, and basic defensive tactics training.

Together, these programs promote positive engagement, education, and leadership development while inspiring the next generation to consider careers in public service.

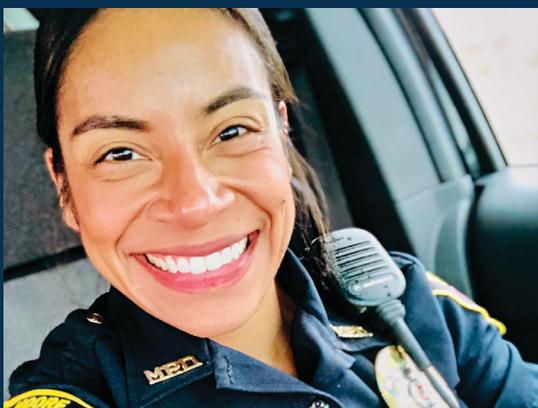

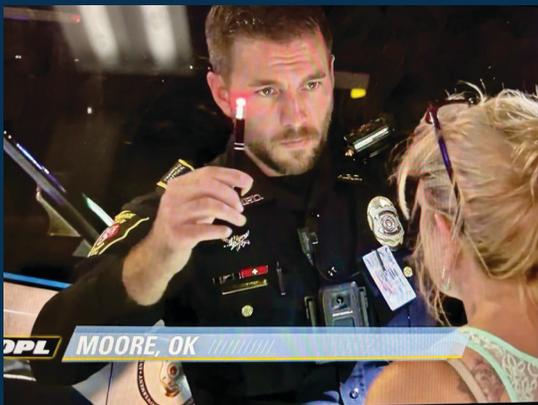

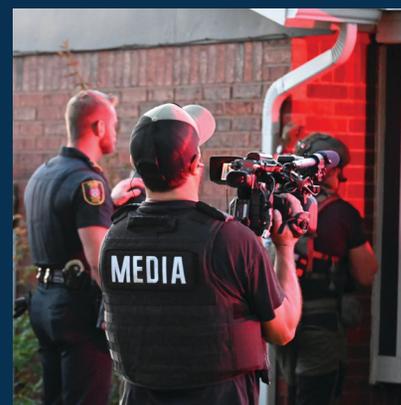
